Read-Aloud Tips & Reminders

- Make predictions
- Before you read What do you think the story will be about?
- While you are reading What do you think will happen next?
- After reading What do you think the character will do or what would you have done?
- Look at the illustrations What do you notice?
- Ask for evidence when students answer comprehension questions - What makes you think that or what part of the story told you that or where can we find that in the story?

- Look for new or unfamiliar vocabulary words
- Discuss the meaning of new words and how they are used in the story
- Discuss words with multiple meanings, for ex: bat can mean a baseball bat or the animal
